Principal's Report



Dear Parent / Carers

The NSW Government announced this week that it was releasing our new "High Potential and Gifted Students policy". There are some good resources being developed to support the policy and literature review can be found at:

Challenging students to achieve their personal best is the goal of all Department of Education schools. Having a system that meets the needs of all students with different schools is vital to the success of NSW public schools.

Two new roles for staff to support your child are now operating. The Senior Curriculum Advisor, Mr Youssef (our PDHPE Head Teacher), is working closely with Year 11 and Year 12 students. He is currently organising Year 12 to receive some revision work in the holiday and a timetable will be out very soon. We are also interviewing Year 12 students in a panel review to see that students are clear about goals and how to best achieve them. Once this is done, he will start work with Year 11 students.

The new Literacy Co ordinator, Ms Sue Begg (Head Teacher English), will lead a literacy team of interested staff who will develop and implement an action plan for literacy improvement across the school and provide professional learning for all staff on a regular basis. The role will also involve coordinating the 'Best Start Literacy' test in 2020, for Year 7 students and analysing results from that test.

We are showcasing two important events for students and parents in the second last week of term:

- 1. Year 8 Subject selection evening 5.00pm to 6.30pm
- 2. Third Elective Showcase 6.30pm to 8.00pm

A huge thank you to the staff for organising the events and in anticipation of both parents and students attending.

The CAPA faculty have been busy with 'The Synergy Dance Festival', where we performed a contemporary dance item. Thank you to Ms McLaughlin for organising our students for this event. In the last week of term our students will be performing at the 'Pulse'

event held at The Opera House. We have a large group of students performing in both individual items and choir, so again, a thank you to Ms Piper for organising this great event.

University is wonderful but it's not for everyone.



LIBRARY NEWS



Advanced Web Searching using AND, OR, -, " ", *, site:

AND

By adding **AND** between terms, you are limiting your search to only those items described by all the terms you list. Some search engines (e.g., Google) use an implied AND, so that they automatically search for the combination of the words you enter. (example: chicken AND nuggets)

OR

If you have a very specific keyword, you may not be getting enough results or the type of information that you want. Sometimes, it is better to increase the range of your results by adding **OR** between terms. (example: death penalty OR capital punishment).

Sometimes, you will want to exclude certain terms if they interfere with the results that you want. (example: charcoal -chicken)

"...."

This type of searching involves putting quotation marks "" around a phrase or group or words so they will always be found next to each other. (example: "charcoal chicken")

*

This type of searching involves putting an asterix * after a word. The search engine will return any result that begins with the word truncated by the asterix. (example: admin* will return: administrator, administration, administer, administered)..

site

This search strategy limits your search to only those results found in specific and more credible websites such as educational or government sites (example: charcoal chicken site:edu, charcoal chicken site:gov)
